A step forward, we hope in the right direction has been taken by this league. The Control Board as a ruling body has now been dissolved and a new control board formed in its place. What is so new about that you may ask. Well in actual fact the new board instead of only five members as before, now consists of the following:- General Secretary, Divisional Sec., and Treasurer. These three members are permanent in their respective positions. A Chairman will be elected at each General Meeting to preside over that meeting, but he will only be Chairman just for that one meeting, a new one presiding over succeeding meetings.

Sitting on the board and forming a League management Committee will be two members from each club belonging to the League, also a reserve member, but who may not take an active part in any business discussed. However if one or other of the elected members is absent then the reserve may take his place.

The above board took up their duties from April 28th and will be as outlined above except for Mr. W.J.Cattle who was the old boards Chairman. It was agreed by all present at this meeting that he should continue as Chairman until October, when the meetings from that month onwards should have an elected Chairman for each meeting.

Elected to the positions of General Sec. was Mr R.Johnson, Div.Sec/P.R.O. Mr A.Jones, Treasurer Mr J.Braden.

One of the first decisions made by the new board was the allocation of former Beckenham rider Brian Jarrett to Tooting. The allocation was made subject to the condition that Jarratt wrote a letter to the League stating his intentions to ride for Tooting upon receipt of which he would be registered for that club.

The protest regarding the Thornton Heath Cobras v Tooting Tigers League match on April 19th was then heard, the Boards decision being that the match be re-run at a later date. A request from the Southern Counties S.C.League for a junior test match to be held at Brighton was turned down, due to funds being low at present.

So much for C.B. business. Looking round the tracks the Saunders Trophy semi-finals were run off on April 26th. Raynes Park Tigers had a fairly easy passage to the Final defeating a Tooting team without Pete Jarman and Brian Greatly by 60½-35½. In the other semi-final Rhynes Park shocked Edmonton Monarchs by running up a six point lead in the first four heats.
