SOUTHAMPTON VIKINGS, in their first season in the Home Counties League, have pulled off the treble. They won the First Division, the First Division Knock Out Cup, and the Home Counties Knock Out Cup. This was the same treble that Uxbridge carried off last year. Vikings are a credit to the League. Not because of this feat only, for a team can be a credit to the League without even winning. No, Vikings have earned respect because they are a good club, well run, have a new track which is of decent standard (even if it is big!), and do not resort to foul methods of riding.

Despite being held to a draw by a lively Rayleigh side, this was enough to give Uxbridge runners-up position. They were also finalists in the First Division Knock Out Cup. The other cup finalists against the Vikings were Tolworth. Southampton's only loss was against Whipps Cross.

In the second division, Hungerford clinched the honours after a dodgy start. They were also in the final of the second division knock out cup, losing by four points to runners-up in the second division, Hackney.

Little wonder that clubs prefer to race in the first division where teams are more established and unlikely to close down. In three seasons no first division side has folded in the racing season. The second division has operated for two years and we have had four closures in midstream, Harefield and Chessington last year, and East Ham and Uxbridge this. Second division clubs already have fewer matches than their first division counterparts without the frustration of clubs disbanding.

Newham's fantastic prospect Charlie Hunt must qualify for the season's unluckiest rider. After only a few weeks he was making everybody sit up by returning high scores. Then he fractured his wrist. More trouble ten days later when he had to have it reset again.

The Home Counties Presentation Dance is to be held at the Battle Of Britain hall at Uxbridge on January 15th. Tickets are 6/6d..... Good to see that Bucklebury are building up a second team of new riders. Obviously with an eye to the future....

Watford, despite having no track, have an abundance of riders..... Hammer Dave Tulloch is shortly moving to Basildon, but he has stated that he will definitely continue to ride for Newham.....
